News from the Lake...

Docks In? Cinder Blocks To Detect Zebra Mussels Should Also Be In

After you install your dock for the season, please remember to attach your cinder block to your dock. It should be hung about a foot off the bottom of the lake. If you don't have a cinder block, please let me know and I will get you one free of charge.

Remember to check it in mid-July, again in mid-August, plus at the end of the season.

Other AIS News

Unfortunately, Zebra Mussels are being found closer to Hubbard County. Leech Lake and Cass Lake are now infested; so if you use those lakes please remember to have your boat pressure washed. It is free of charge and the decontamination station is located next to the Hubbard County Transfer Station.

New threats are the Spiny Waterflea and Starry Stonewort. To see examples of them, just Google them on line. At this time they are only found in a couple of lakes in the state.

Still Clean and Clear

Our lake is still one of the cleanest and clearest lakes in Minnesota. Let's make sure we keep it that way!

Ice Out and Loons Return:

The good news is the ice went out in early April and the loons returned by mid-April. It has been great to hear their calls again day and night.

Speaking of loons, our lake has three nesting platforms and one natural nesting platform. Please slow down (NO WAKE!) and avoid these areas

while the loons are still on the nest. A large wake can cause the platform to rock and the eggs to fall off. Also, give them plenty of room on the lake, especially when the young first hatch and cannot yet dive. The loon parents have enough to worry about with eagles and hawks.

Wildlife

Two pair of bald eagles frequent the lake and often land on a limb in front of our house—much to the chagrin of the loons. A mother bear and her three cubs have visited bird feeders and porches on both sides of the lake—and Dan Kittilson has photos of one of the bears.

Dorset

The entire Metropolis of Dorset is now open, some with limited hours/days in May, and the 2017 Dorset Bugle newspaper is hot off the press!

Little Sand's Loons

The first loons were sighted on Little Sand in mid-April, shortly after the ice



went off the lake. That's always a reassuring sign of spring being right around the corner. Spring has come and gone a few times since then, with some above average high temps, but then even a few snow flurries in May—a typical Minnesota spring!

We ask that everyone be respectful of our loons as they nest, and throughout the open lake season. PLEASE STAY AWAY FROM THE NESTS! Do not use loon calls during this time when the loons are on the nests as this may cause them to abandon the eggs.

There are three nesting platforms on Little Sand, with all three presently having loons nesting. Dick Peters has been the DNR's official observer for many years, with Roger Hochsprung assisting him. A big THANK YOU, Dick! Roger will now be our main observer and in charge of placing the platforms. If you see a natural loon nest or baby loons, please call Roger (218-639-9591) to report them. If you see anyone harassing the loons, report it to the DNR or the Sheriff.

Personalized Dock Name Signs



Summer Little Sand residents Larry and Karen Odegard are again making signs to be mounted on the lakeside end of your dock. Names are routed into composite decking material preventing any water rotting issues. There are already over 25 signs on our Little Sand Lake.

Sign panels are 5½" high, have letters 4½" in height for easy reading from the water, with the length depending on the number of letters in your name. The signs have a Little Sand Lake logo in lighter blue color and your name can be done in any of several standard colors. Cost is \$45.00 for the first seven letters and \$5.00 additional per letter after seven. Five dollars (\$5.00) of that price is donated to Little Sand AIS Fund. These are high-quality signs and a real value for the price. Custom road signs are also available.

FROM OUR MINNESOTA DNR

DNR Firewise program helps rural homeowners reduce wildland fire risks

Seven out of 10 structures destroyed by wildfire are ignited by the embers that land on the property and start small fires that find a suitable fuel bed (woodpile under deck, pine needles in gutters, tall grass in yard) that ignites a portion of a home or cabin.

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources' Firewise program provides tips to rural homeowners to reduce the risks of wildfires to their homes and cabins. Property owners who reduce the likelihood that an ember finds a suitable fuel bed, can significantly reduce the likelihood that their home or cabin will ignite.

The Firewise program identifies four factors homeowners can control that affect whether a home will survive a wildfire - access, site, structure and burning practices.

Access

Access affects how easily firefighters and emergency vehicles can find and access a home. Without good access and escape routes, firefighters will not endanger themselves to save a home.

Defensible zone

Creating a 100-foot "defensible zone" around your home or cabin, especially the 30 feet surrounding it, is critical to its chance of surviving a wildfire.

Anything flammable, including firewood piles and accumulated leaf and needle fall around foundations and decks should be removed.

Firewood or other combustible materials should not be stored in the zone. Decks within 5 feet of the ground should be enclosed with metal screening or sheeting. The area under decks, unless completely enclosed with metal screening, should not be used for storage.

A 10-foot minimum space should be maintained between evergreen tree crowns, and the tree crowns and home. This prevents fire from jumping tree to tree and tree to home.

Grass, leaves and branches provide a ladder for fuel to climb from ground to tree crown. These fuels can be eliminated by mowing tall grass, trimming shrubs and pruning the lower tree branches up 6 to 10 feet, or one-third of the tree height. Lawns should be kept green and mowed short to prevent fire from carrying to other areas.

Reducing fuels in the wooded area within the 100-foot zone and beyond will reduce the intensity of an approaching wildfire. Trees should be thinned/removed to increase their spacing, underbrush reduced and remaining trees pruned up 6 to 10 feet or one-third of the tree height. This will reduce the fuels and lessen the wildfire intensity.

Structure

Home modifications that further reduce wildfire risk include re-siding with brick, stone, stucco or steel, replacing shake roofing with class A shingles or steel, and enclosing foundations, decks and overhangs with steel, masonry or less expensive flame-resistant sheeting.

Burning Practices

The number one cause of wildfires in Minnesota is escaped debris burning fires. If you burn leaves and debris, consider alternatives like composting. Recreational fires should be located in a fire-safe pit or container and completely extinguished before left unattended.
